


The Watchtower McHugh's, March 15th 2025

Delivery Service played what I would call *Daria* soundtrack indie. 3 members of the band shared vocal duties, each taking the lead on different songs. 1 member was pulling triple duty; singing, playing the guitar & playing a plinky-plonky synth keyboard, all at the same time. If they put out an album, I'd listen to it.

Fightmilk were over from England - "we're sorry" they said. They played indie punk & joshed with the audience between songs. Topics included: love & relationships, being bitten on the arse by a dog, being sacked from being a bridesmaid, body image. They asked people in the audience to name fictional dogs during the dog-arse-bite song. I confess that I shouted out "that rabid dog that kills a toddler at the start of Penelope Spheeris' movie *Suburbia*". I think the lead singer of **Fightmilk** said something like "intense!".

There are approximately 1 million people in Britain who are in bands like **Fightmilk**. In Ireland, there are only 4 or 5 bands like **Fightmilk** at all.

Problem Patterns played a barnstorming set. Many of the new songs are more shouty & thrashy than the songs that appeared on their album *Blouse Club*. I find this very exciting & would love to see where they are going with this. **Problem Patterns** seemed to be feeling the effects of their DIY all-Ireland tour. 1 member talked about feeling wrecked & hungover; singer Alanah (she's Canadian!) was counting the songs until she could stop singing lead vocals. There was almost a moshpit at the end, thanks to Bev (I think).

I bought a piss yellow **Problem Patterns** t-shirt, asked 2 of the band a lot of silly questions, then went home.

(I think it was Bev & Bethany? I should have asked....)

Q: When's the next album out?

A: There's an EP coming out "soon, we're not allowed to say when". They are working on their next album.

Q: Can you tell us the title of the next album?

A: No.

"Mustard yellow" "Green, but it changes every day".

Q: Should golf be illegal?

A: "Waste of a good walk", ban it. DISSENT IN THE BAND! Bev says "No," because they stayed at a hotel on a golf course during the tour & while taking a morning walk she saw lots of nice wildlife. "If the golfers left the golf course maybe that would be better".

Q: Will you become a skinhead band?

A: "Absolutely not" "We don't fit into that aesthetic, we're not serious enough" (??!)

Q: How much does the film *Velvet Goldmine* mean to you, if anything?

A: "Never heard of it", "Nothing"

Q: Favourite fictional dogs?

A: "We're a big Wallace & Grommit band, so Grommit" "Beethoven"

Bev says, "We have this joke about the band being like Clifford The Big Red Dog, he grew too big because people loved him so much"

A: "Anything by **Beauty Sleep, Joel Harkin**" "Year of the Sofa by **Junk Drawer**"

PUNC got out of Dublin again for this Drogheda date on the **Surge/Hedgling** spring tour of 2025.

Bedsores were a drummer, a bass player, a guitar player, a saxophone player, a singer & what seemed to maybe be a DJ. When they began playing, I thought to myself that if they opened the gates of hell, this was what it would sound like.

I thought all their songs would be as far out on the edge of listenability, but apparently this was just the "intro". As their set went on, they played something that was more easily recognizable as music, & even played a few tunes.

My review of Bedsores is positive.

Hedgling were difficult to describe. Natalia Beylis & Willie Stewart sat in front of two small tables covered with balls, drums, wires, cassette players & all sorts of unidentifiable objects. Someone whistled when the sewing machine got brought out. I sat on the floor to watch **Hedgling**: it seemed appropriate somehow. Time seemed to slow down. They looked like witches or alchemists in the low light, as they conjured strange sounds out of thin air.

My review of Hedgling is positive.

Surge are not as blisteringly loud in person as they are on record (see their 2016 release "Avalanche" on bandcamp & you'll see what I mean). Despite or maybe because of this, I enjoyed them very much. Lead singer Denise was a formidable presence. My best efforts to get the pit going were unsuccessful as the dancefloor at the Watchtower is small & the crowd was reluctant.

My review of Surge is positive.

PUNC TALKS TO....

....NATALIA BEYLIS

TIME: 11th of April, 2025, after the SURGE/HEDGLING/BEDSORES gig at The Watchtower McHugh's. **PLACE:** The stairwell in McHugh's.

THE UNLUCKY VICTIM: Natalia Beylis, of Hedgling.....

PUNC: How would you describe your music?

Natalia: "Somebody tonight said it made them want to puke, but in a good way."

PUNC: Where do you get your equipment?

"Often at the recycling centre, charity shops, and then people who are getting rid of things & think I might like them."

PUNC: How important is the BBC Radiophonics workshop to you, if at all?

"It's important, but I'd say like, Delia Derbyshire would be more important than it in itself."

PUNC: Do you believe in astrology?

"I don't know. Do I believe in it? I like it and I enjoy hearing about it. Does it believe in me?"

PUNC: Can you tell me about the history of the sewing machine as a musical instrument?

"It's been used a lot, I'm not by far the first and hopefully not the last. I hope I inspire many other people, I have dreams of compilations of sewing machine magic. But it's been used since at least the 50s in music & sonic ways."

PUNC: What's your badge for? [points to badge on Natalia's hoodie]

"It's a brilliant band called **Blood Stereo** who are no longer known as **Blood Stereo**, they use lots of toys and stuff and recently they did a gig where, one of them did a gig where, they just played online bingo."

At this point PUNC had run out of questions & it looked like the interview was going to come to a premature end. However, we were right under the stairs near the door to the bar (& the toilets), so people kept walking by us. I dragooned a few of them into providing some more interview questions.

PUNC: We're interviewing Natalia! Do you have a question for her?

Áine The Factory Roof: Do you use the sewing machine outside of the music?

Natalia: "Not well."

Aoife: So Natalia, did you play normal music before you started playing noise music?

Natalia: "Yes. Classical piano."

Aoife: When did you make the transition to all out weirdness?

Natalia: "Maybe when I moved to Leitrim? Let's go with that."

PUNC: One last question....do you have anything you would like to say to all the people out there?


Natalia: Just keep doing what you're doing and eventually you'll find the other people who are in to doing that too."

The history of the peace symbol is not very well known. The story is worth revisiting as we struggle to respond to the US-Israeli genocide in Gaza.


The peace sign was invented by Gerald Holtom. He was a graphic designer who was also a member of the UK-based Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament.

In the early 1960s, the potential dangers of nuclear war was being seriously downplayed by the powers that be. CND tried to make everyone aware of the reality with marches & petitions. Some CND members formed the more radical Committee of 100 to take direct action against the state: the anonymous Spies for Peace even found a secret government nuclear bunker in the British countryside & broke in, copying & publishing the documents they found there.



CND marched to the atomic weapons research lab at Aldermaston every year. Gerald Holtom was asked to design a symbol that could be carried by marchers. The peace symbol is shaped like the semaphore signals for "ND" - Nuclear Disarmament. It means something else, though. Here's what Gerald Holtom wrote about the symbol in *Peace News*:

"I was in despair. Deep despair. I drew myself: the representative of an individual in despair, with hands palm outstretched outwards and downwards in the manner of Goya's peasant before the firing squad. I formalised the drawing into a line and put a circle round it."



The peace symbol was later taken up by the movement against the war in Vietnam. As for how the peace symbol became a depoliticized symbol of being nice, printed on babygros and blankets by big corporations....Well, sin sceal eile. Me, I blame the hippies. The symbol became associated with the new music, clothes, drugs & lifestyles being adopted by young, relatively well-educated & wealthy westerners. The media seized on the more marketable aspects of the new counterculture & discarded the substance, while a new reactionary right-wing movement came creeping up at the end of the 70s. Anyone who was excited about feminism in the 2010s will remember how this can happen.

The CND movement had a huge resurgence in the early 80s. Reagan was moving nuclear warheads into Europe. Politicised punks adopted the anti-nuclear movement & the peace symbol en masse. Punks wrote zines, played benefits, shook buckets, bought CND badges (Paul Weller wore one on Top of the Pops) & participated in protests, direct actions, & occupations of military bases.

The women-led occupation of Greenham Common base in Wales attracted thousands of supporters from around the world & huge press attention. Women camped in the shit & the mud for 10+ years to protest against the presence of long-range Cruise nuclear missiles. Gorbachev cited the Greenham Common protests as an influence on his decision to meet with Reagan & sign a treaty limiting the use of nuclear weapons in 1987.

That treaty has now lapsed. The Chagos Islanders are still refugees. The world is still scarred by the aftermath of the nuclear-industrial complex. The Irish sea is the most radioactively contaminated sea in the world due to nuclear waste dumped there by Britain.

It's convenient if we forget, so we have to remember. The peace symbol came from a place of pain. The peace symbol doesn't represent being nice to people. It represents despair at violence & inhumanity, at industrialized warfare & genocidal ambitions.

The peace symbol represents the first, fragile gesture we can make in the face of cruelty - our arms, outstretched, to protect or to warn. The gesture that can lead to thousands of people marching, striking, boycotting & fighting. The gesture that even still might not be enough.

Victim (1961)

If this film doesn't leave you feeling miserable, nothing will! Made when homosexuality was still illegal in Britain, this is a legal thriller about a blackmailer who is driving gay men to suicide. An otherwise slightly tedious melodrama is elevated by a seething performance from (closeted, gay) actor Dirk Bogarde. He plays a (closeted, gay) lawyer. "I stopped seeing him because I wanted him. Because I wanted him!"





Pigs (1984)

The IMDb synopsis of this movie refers to its setting as "an apocalyptic Dublin". When I finally saw the film, I was surprised to realize that there were no sci-fi elements. The "apocalyptic" setting was just Dublin in the early 80s. This is a collosally depressing film about a impoverished gay man who moves into a derelict building as a squatter. Very little happens, but he is subjected to relentless homophobia, despite being in the closet even to himself. A truly miserable film.

Bastardy (2009)

I have been told that this documentary "isn't that depressing". Nevertheless, it does feature enough footage of people shooting up heroin to ensure it never makes it onto any lists of "feelgood films for Pride Month". Jack Charles was an actor, a musician, & a pioneer of Black Theatre in Australia. His other career - as an addict & burglar - eventually started to get in the way of his acting. *Bastardy* follows him during the last years of his addiction, while simultaneously unravelling his life story as a member of the Stolen Generations. Definitely the best film on this list.
